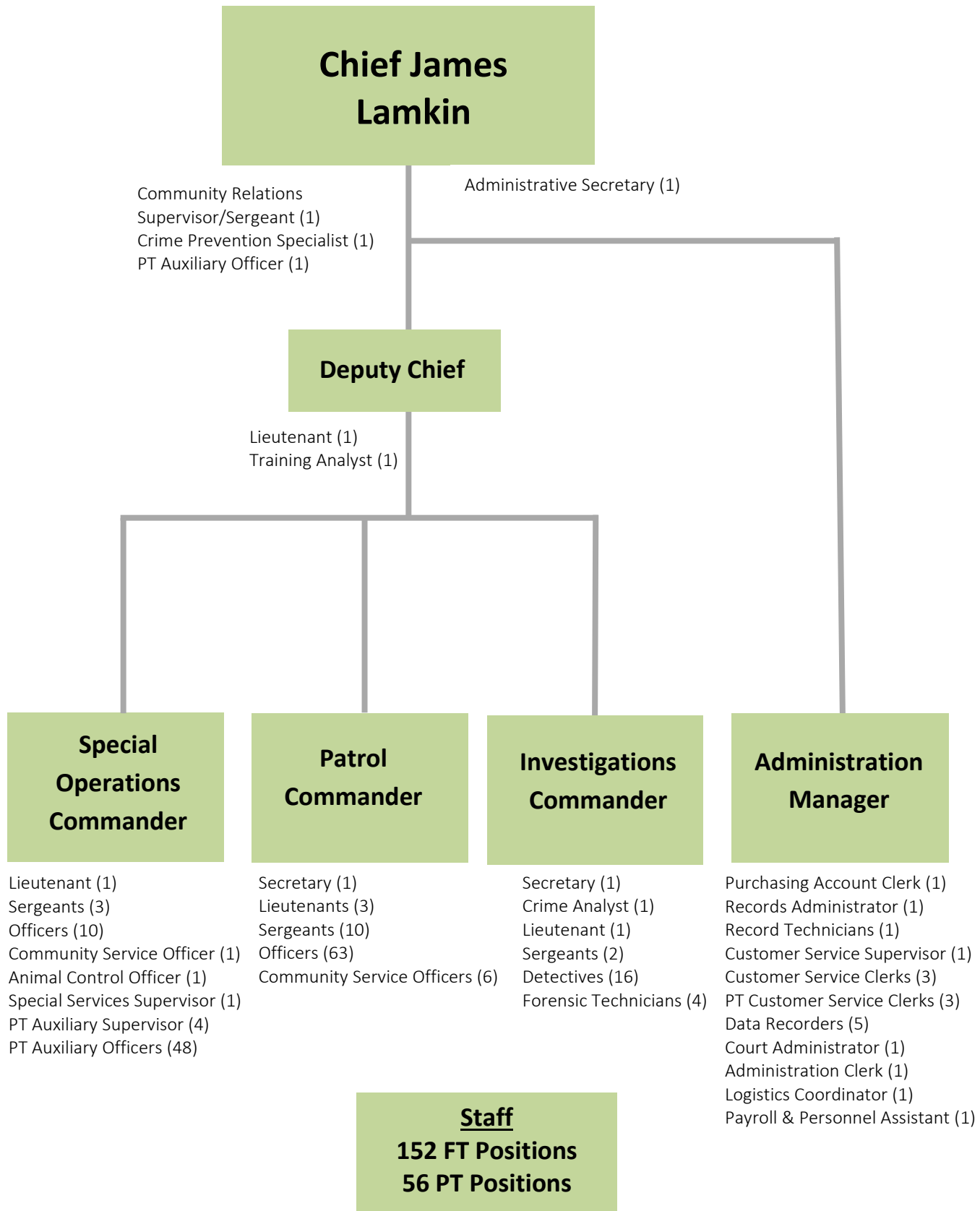

DEPARTMENT OVERVIEW

The Police Department's mission is to "Serve, protect and enhance the quality of life through community partnerships." The Police Department is committed to the philosophy of community policing. By working together with citizens, businesses, schools, community groups, elected officials, public agencies, and other village departments, we can make a difference. The employees are empowered to take ownership over their particular area of assignment, and to be proactive in identifying and solving problems in the community. By embracing the village's organizational values of customer service, respect, trust, teamwork and integrity, public confidence will be maintained.

The Police Department is divided into four divisions, Patrol, Administration, Investigations, and Special Operations, each commanded by a Commander. With a mix of sworn and civilian personnel, an efficient and effective work force is provided. The vision of the Police Department is to "be a model law enforcement agency viewed internally and externally as professional, enthusiastic, trustworthy, and at the forefront of the police profession." The members of the Police Department are committed toward the attainment of this vision.

KEY ACTIVITIES

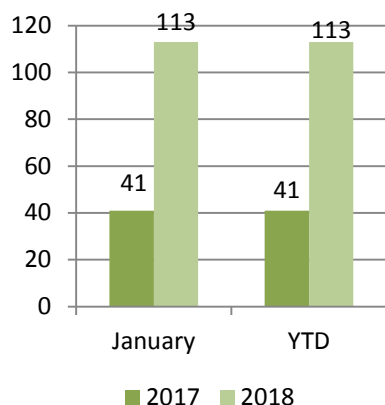
- **Arson of a Vehicle** - 200 block of Sierra Pass for a car fire. Patrol arrested one subject on scene and Investigations assisted.
- **Criminal Trespass to Residence** - 1400 block Albany Court for a resident who awoke to find an unknown subject in her apartment. The subject fled on foot, area was checked by K-9 and patrol with negative results. Both Investigations and Forensics responded.
- **Robbery** - Homewood Suites Hotel, 815 American Lane. A front desk employee reported a guest was bleeding and reported a robbery. Upon arrival officers were unable to locate the victim. The area was checked for both a victim and offender, report completed.
- **Attempted Armed Car Jacking** - Starbucks, 601 N. Martingale Road, Streets of Woodfield. A victim reported an attempted theft of his vehicle. Police responded and checked the area. Both Investigations and Forensics responded.
- **Armed Robbery** - 7-11, 920 Bode Road. The offender implied a weapon and fled on foot. An officer located the offender a short distance away and took him into custody without incident. Investigations assisted and the offender was charged.
- **Attempted Armed Robbery** - Meacham and Brookdale Roads. A male black offender displayed a weapon and attempted a robbery of another motorist. The area was checked and the victim declined to pursue complaints.
- **Missing Juvenile** - Woodbury Court, a 12-year old boy left his residence at 9:00 PM and hadn't returned home for several hours. A DuPage County bloodhound and Illinois State Police plane assisted. A reverse 911 call was placed in the morning. The juvenile was located several blocks away.

Adjudication is the process in which a person can contest a ticket that they received; these are the numbers for contested tickets compared to the same time last year.

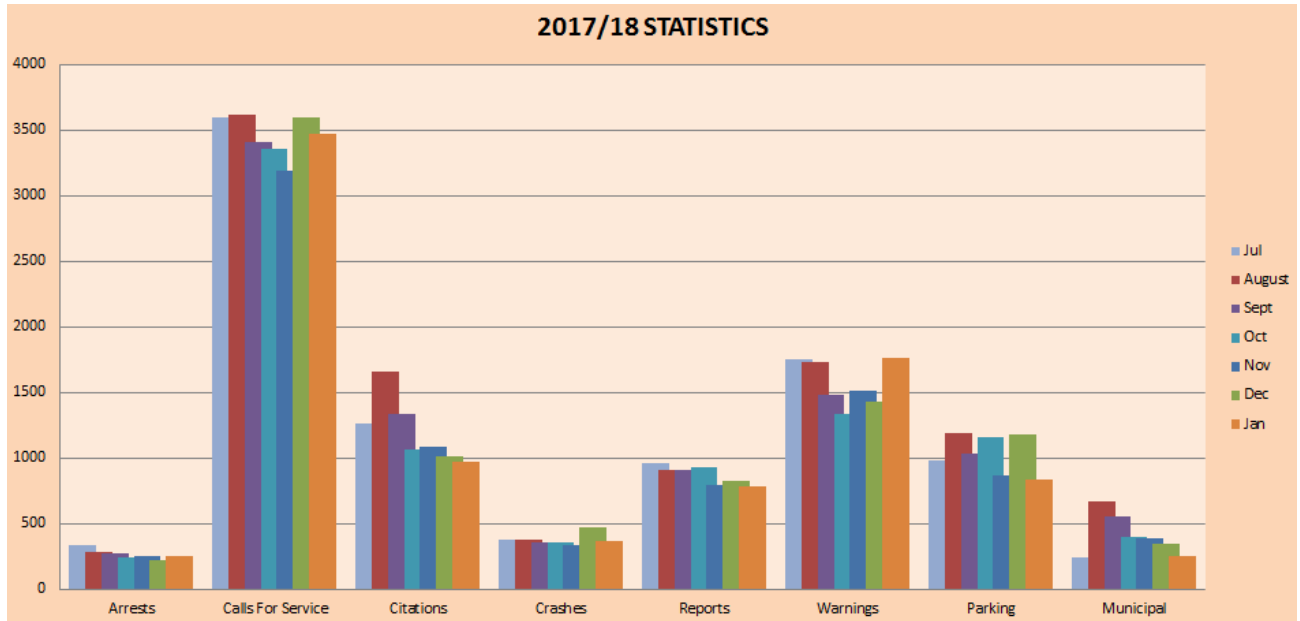

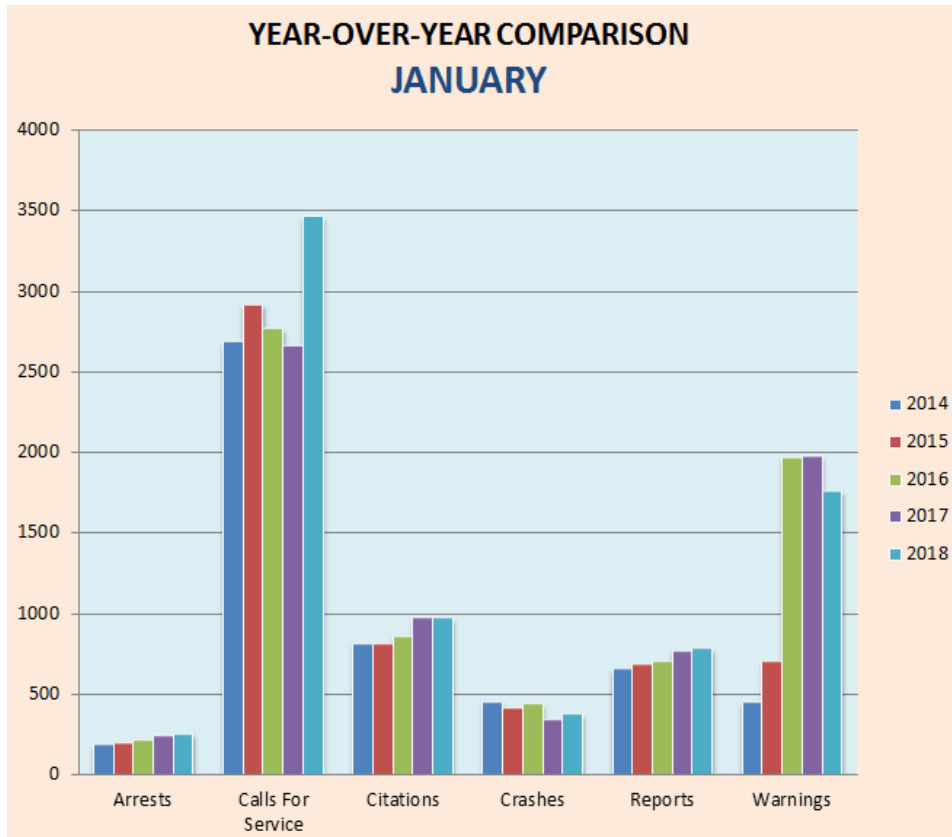
A comparative view of activity from the previous 6 months.

NOTABLE ACTIVITIES

Below are summaries from the Patrol, Investigations, and Special Operations Divisions as well as the Crime Prevention Section for activities that occurred during January 2018.

Investigations Division

- Armed Robbery - Detectives and the FBI investigated a bank robbery at MB Financial Bank. In corroboration with both the FBI and other jurisdictions with similar incidents, a suspect was developed after interviewing witnesses and processing evidence. The suspect ultimately arrested four days later at O’Hare Airport. He was charged federally with armed bank robbery.
- Armed Robbery and Theft - In November, Detectives began working case involving an armed robbery of the Subway on Roselle Road. The offender entered the store, displayed a handgun, demanded cash and then fled the scene. Through this investigation, it was learned that not only had the same offender committed a theft at a 7-11 also located in Schaumburg a few weeks prior but was also a suspect in numerous burglaries in Champaign on the University of Illinois - Urbana Champaign campus. After collaborating with Detectives in Champaign, an address in Chicago and Champaign were identified. Surveillance was conducted on numerous occasions along with the assistance of the Chicago Police Department in an attempt to locate the suspect. After the suspect was arrested, SPD

Detectives garnered a full confession and the offender was subsequently charged with armed robbery and theft. He was also charged for offenses committed in Champaign County.

- Arson and Burglary to Motor Vehicle - Police and fire units responded to a vehicle fire. It was later determined to be a suspicious fire and was classified as Arson. A suspicious subject was located in the area and was interviewed. After gathering incriminating evidence, the subject gave a full confession to committing the arson. He also admitted to breaking into another vehicle in the area and stealing money and other items of value. He was charged with both felonies.
- Residential Burglary, Theft, and Criminal Damage to Property - Detectives investigated a burglary whereby the house sitter was the main suspect. It was determined that the individual who was responsible to watch the homeowners' pet had a party at the home without the permission of the residents. The partygoers stole items from the home, damaged furniture, and used/damaged the resident's vehicle without permission. All were identified, interviewed and gave confessions to committing these acts. Complaints were signed and charges approved for two adult offenders and one juvenile.
- Residential Burglary, Theft - An offender was identified after he broke into a home, stole items, and stole the victim's vehicle that was parked in the garage. Detectives worked with Elk Grove and Carpentersville police departments in regards to the same type of incidents that occurred in their towns. Two suspects were developed and ultimately arrested and charged in Kane County. Detectives took confessions from offenders while being detained at the Kane County Jail on similar charges. Charges were ultimately approved after a DNA sample was identified and linked to the offender.
- Theft - An employee of a local bank was arrested after stealing over \$50,000 USC over the period of a month. Financial crimes detectives worked with bank investigators to gather evidence. The State's Attorney's Office approved a charge of felony theft.
- Missing Juvenile - Detectives worked with the Patrol and Special Operations Division in regards to a 12 year old child who had left his parents' home after an argument. The juvenile had been missing overnight after all locations were initially checked by responding Patrol Officers. With the help of an Illinois State Police surveillance plane and the DuPage County Blood Hounds, the child was located the next morning after being outside all evening on the run.

Crime Prevention

Events

- On January 24, Crime Prevention conducted a senior safety presentation at the Senior Barn. This month, the topic included ruse burglaries and car safety. Lisa Bezella provided tips on fire safety in the home.

Community Outreach

- Crime Prevention met with members of the Support Our Senior group to discuss the upcoming Senior Scam event which will be held on May 29. We also discussed hosting a personal safety event in the fall of 2018 for seniors to provide general personal safety tips.
- Crime Prevention continued working on updating the Project Help program with the assistance of volunteer Betty Hlad. Renewal forms are being received and information is getting updated.
- Community Outreach met with the fire department to discuss the upcoming Youth in Government program with The Village of Schaumburg and Schaumburg High School.
- Community Outreach met with members of Prince of Peace Church to discuss conducting a CPTED Survey and active shooter training at the church. The CPTED security inspection was completed for the church.
- Community Outreach participated in the CPYD Coalition Meeting with area service providers within the community focused on challenges among our youth.

Tour

- A tour was conducted for a Girl Scout Troop. Fifteen Girl Scouts were in attendance.

Crime Free Multi-Housing

- CFMH continued to work on the audit of non-compliant property owners by updating records and providing alternative ways for property owners to become compliant.
- One CFMH seminar was offered at the Prairie Arts Center. The seminar was attended by thirty-six property owners.

Special Operations Division

During the month, Traffic Unit Officers continued to conduct daily enforcement at all local schools. The officers pay particular attention to these locations, specifically during morning drop off and afternoon release. Throughout the month, the officers checked the schools on thirty-five enforcement efforts. Results are as follows:

- 7 - Speeding citations
- 4 - Cellular phone citations
- 4 - Written warnings for various violations

The officers will continue school enforcement throughout the year. In addition to the traffic officers, patrol beat officers and auxiliary officers actively patrol these locations each day.

A department wide Injury Crash Reduction Problem Oriented Policing Project will resume on February 1. We will continue to focus on Springinguth Road between Bode Road and the Metra station. This location has been selected once again based on accident data and the fact that there are three schools, two pools, multiple churches and the train station. It is our hope that by continued/daily enforcement, the department will be able to change driver behavior and gain compliance with speed limits and cellular phone regulations.

Officers responded to a report of a missing juvenile on January 25. The juvenile had reportedly been missing since the previous evening. Numerous resources were utilized in an effort to locate the subject. This call resulted in the department's first activation of the Auxiliary Search and Rescue Unit. Fortunately, the juvenile was located just prior to officers deploying. This was a good opportunity to test the call out procedures. We are formalizing a 2018 Search and Rescue Unit Training Plan, including a mock missing person drill to be held in the fall.

During the month of December, Tactical Unit officers affected one misdemeanor arrest; twelve drug related arrests; one felony drug arrest; two warrant arrests and four traffic arrests. Additionally, the officers conducted forty traffic stops, issuing fourteen citations, sixteen written warnings and sixteen compliance tickets. The officers assigned to the Tactical Unit handled ninety-four calls for service throughout the month, seventy-six of which were self-initiated activity.

In January, Tactical Unit Officers arrested five subjects for prostitution, utilizing a local ordinance. Additionally, inspections were conducted at two massage establishments. Both were in compliance.

Officers assigned to the Tactical Unit are actively involved in a problem oriented policing project to reduce prostitution. As a part of that effort, both patrol and tactical unit officers are each assigned to several hotels and they are responsible for walk-throughs and visits with on-duty staff. These routine checks are geared toward reducing potential criminal activity and building close working relationships with the hotels. In January 2017, hotel checks were completed forty-six times by officers. In May 2017, this initiative was selected as a goal for the police department. Tactical Unit and Patrol officers increased efforts, completing a total of eighty-one hotel checks in January 2018.

Patrol Division

Beat 4 - Sergeant Christiansen

Selective Enforcement

School bus stop arm violations on Weathersfield Way between Roselle Road and Braintree Drive.

Beat Projects

Clarification on stop/speed signs for traffic enforcement in Lakewood Condos following approval of traffic agreement.

Noteworthy Arrests

A homeless subject who regularly generates complaints and causes problems at businesses on Roselle Road was arrested on misdemeanor trespass complaint at 550 S. Roselle Road following prior notice not to be on property. The subject has been notified of trespass violation and arrest if in violation at several locations on Roselle Road.

Beat 7- Sergeant Greenaway

Selective Enforcement

Beat officers have continued to enforce stop sign violations and speed violations on Perimeter Drive. Officers have also been asked to check the parking lots for burglaries to motor vehicles.

Beat Projects

Officers utilized available time to conduct daily patrols of parking lots, and issued numerous crime prevention forms for valuables left in plain view inside parked vehicles. During the month of January 2018, there was no burglary to vehicle reports. In January 2017, there was one burglary to vehicle report and one theft of parts report.

Quality of Life Issues

Officers are engaging in walk and talks inside Woodfield Mall. This is a high visibility program that receives positive feedback from mall security and mall tenants

Notable Mentions

Beginning this year there will be a monthly loss prevention meeting the first Thursday of each month at Woodfield Mall. The beat sergeant and/or a beat officer will be attending some of these meetings.

Beat 8 - Sergeant Quane

Selective Enforcement

Moving Violations (Meacham & I90) - The Beat Team continues to patrol the areas around Meacham and I-90.

Parking Violations (Renaissance Hotel) - The Beat Team reported one chauffer violation around the hotel facility.

Beat Projects

Traffic Enforcement (Meacham & I-90) - In a continuing effort to enhance the safety of the area, beat personnel have aggressively patrolled the area.

Meetings with Citizens/Organizations/Property Management

The monthly Beat Meeting was held on January 18. No citizens from Beat 8 came in to voice any concerns.

Public Service Announcements

The Convention Center had eight exhibits during the month.

On January 14, Governor Rauner was at the Convention Center speaking to the Japanese Chamber of Commerce. No issues reported.

Beat 9 – Acting Sergeant Takei

Selective Enforcement

Officers conducted heavy traffic enforcement specifically for negligent driving incidents, issuing seventy-nine citations for distracted driving, three DUI arrests, and twelve traffic arrests (non-DUI). Additionally there were fifty-four building/hotel checks conducted by officers. Many of these incidents also fall under the “Beat Projects”.

Beat Projects

There were four theft/burglary reports with officers instructed to remain visible in problem areas and three solicitor incidents.

Quality of Life Issues

There were three battery incidents reported, one of which was domestic related, and four prostitution incidents reported. There were also twenty-three vehicle lockouts conducted. Officers responded to fifty-nine traffic crashes. Officers also responded to thirteen motorist assistance calls. There were twelve theft reports, separate from burglaries to motor vehicles. There was one report of public indecency which did not result in an arrest.

Special Watches/Alerts/Missing Persons

There were no special watches, however, officers responded to fifty-five alarm calls, forty-seven of which were burglar alarms.

Noteworthy Arrests

There were no noteworthy arrests this month, however there were a total of nineteen incidents which were coded out with at least one arrest made this month. There were also, at minimum, ninety-two calls coded out with at least one citation issued.

Notable Mentions

On January 7, the boundaries of the beat changed to exclude the entire area northeast of the intersection of Meacham and Golf Roads, a large section of retail establishments and hotels. Additionally, a section of industrial area spanning from the Northwest corner of Meacham and Golf Roads to midway between Basswood and Wilkening Roads was incorporated into Beat 9.

Beat 10 - Sergeant Donovan

Selective Enforcement

Beat Officers have been monitoring the extended stays. They checked in with hotel staff fifty-one times during the month. They were given information on prostitution and investigated several suspicious vehicles. Information was passed on to special operations and follow-up was done with hotel managers.

Beat Projects

Officers have been monitoring Golf and Roselle Roads because it has a high number of traffic crashes. Officers made one traffic stop for suspicion of driving under the influence, issued four written warnings, one negligent driving and one moving violation.

Officers continue to monitor Salem and Colony Lake Plazas for illegal activity. The plazas were checked eighty-two times combined during the month. This paid off when the beat officer was in the area during an attempted armed robbery at Colony Lake Plaza. The subject was taken into custody without incident.

Quality of Life Issues

Officers issued two tickets at the Starbucks on Golf Road after complaints about patrons parking in handicapped spaces.

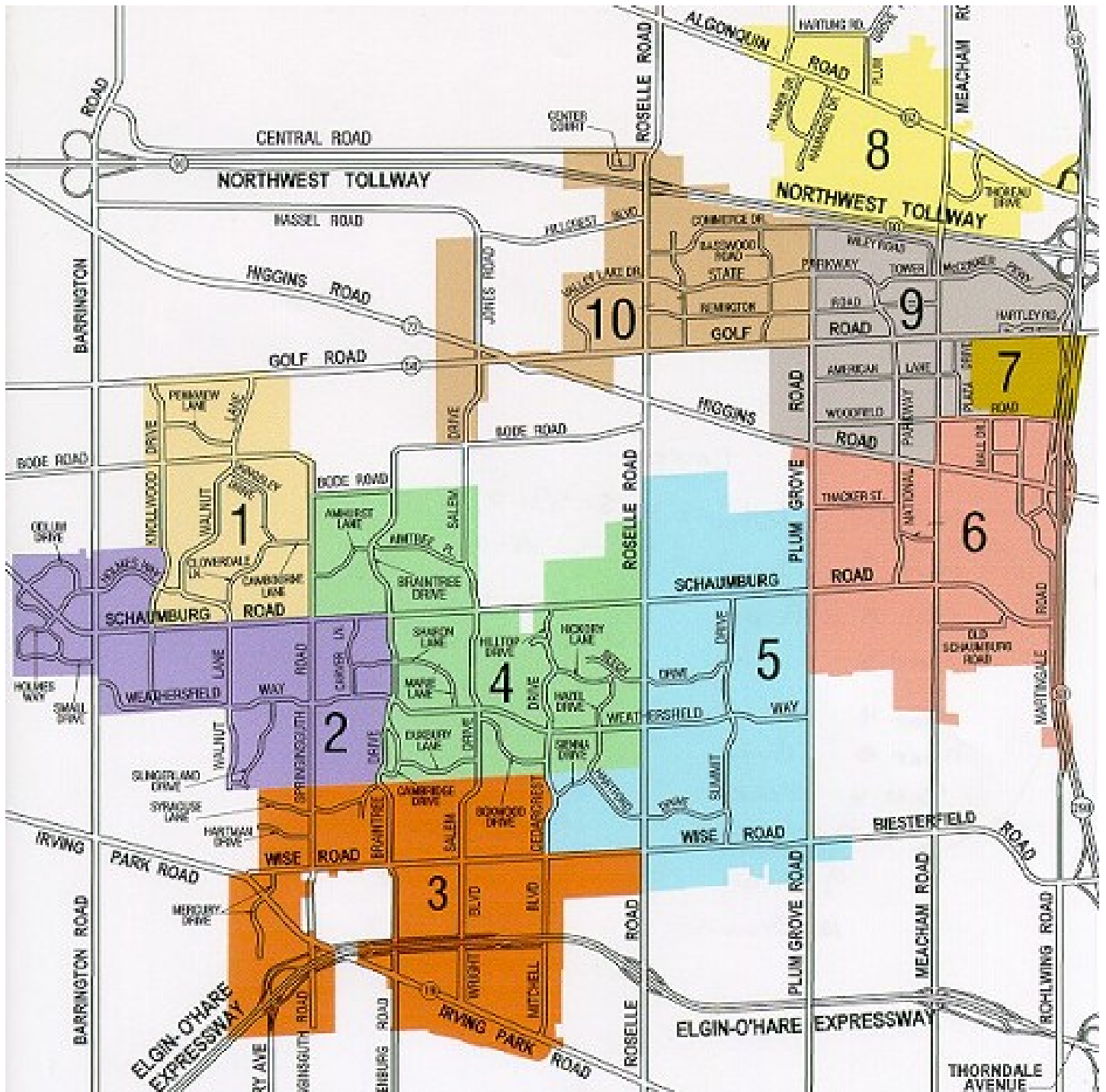
Meetings with Citizens/Organizations/Property Management

Officers have been issuing tickets for noise complaints originating from 75 Kristen Dive. These tickets are scheduled for an adjudication hearing to be held in February.

Noteworthy Arrests

One offender was arrested and charged with armed robbery as he walked away from the 7-11 at Colony Lake Plaza.

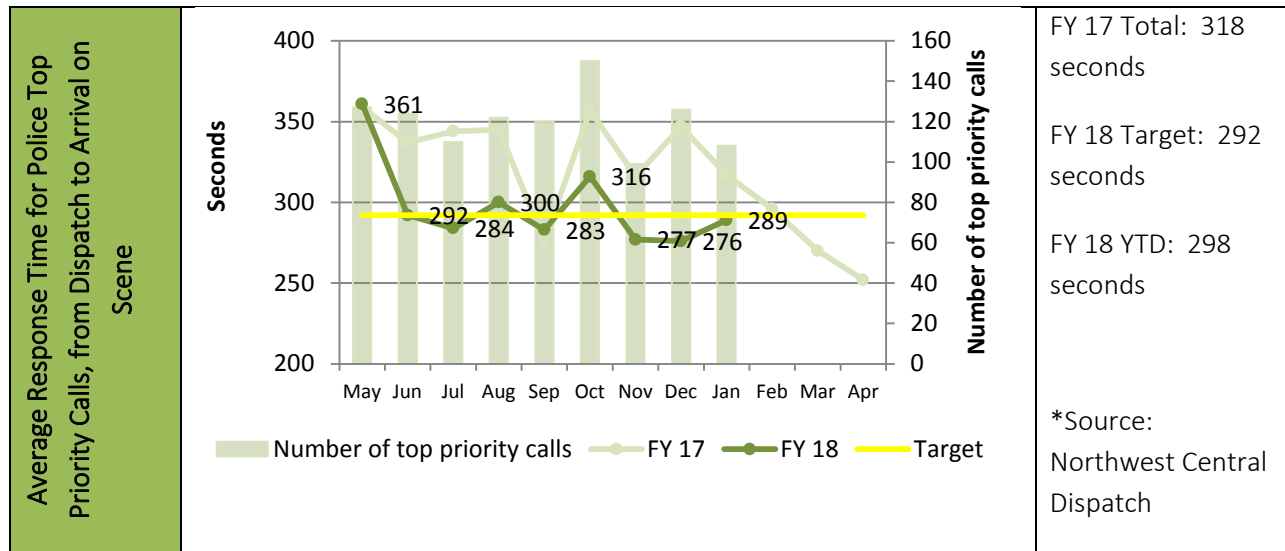
BEAT MAP



KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

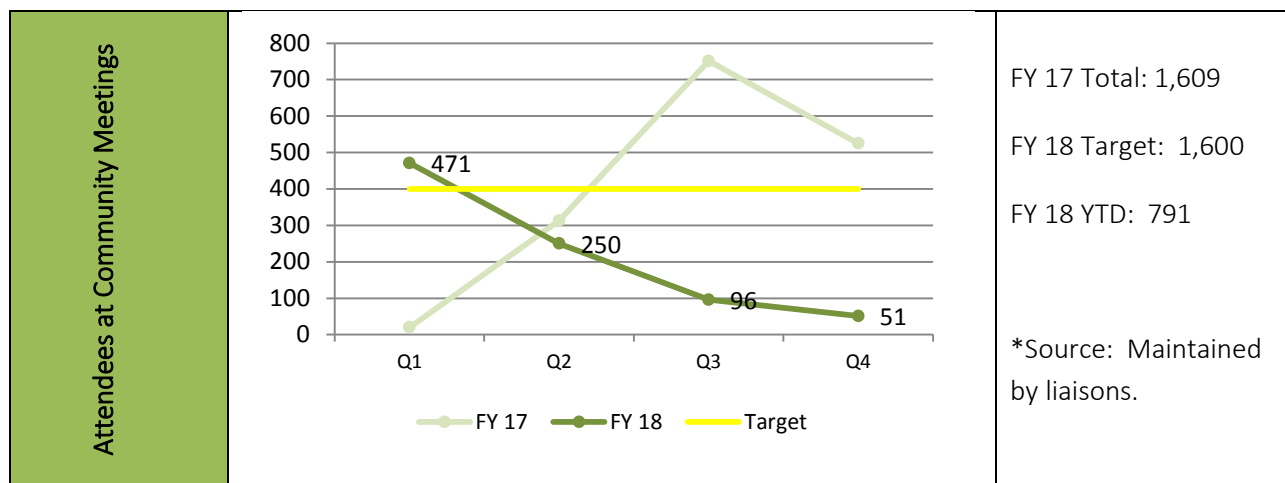
KPI 1: Average Response Time for Police Top Priority Calls

Responding to emergency calls for service is one of the most fundamental services a police department can provide to the residents of that municipality. Providing police service quickly when an emergency occurs is a critical measure of success. This specific performance indicator has not historically been measured in Schaumburg, therefore no benchmark exists. However, our benchmark on this indicator is to maintain current emergency response levels, or to decrease the police response time from year-to-year.



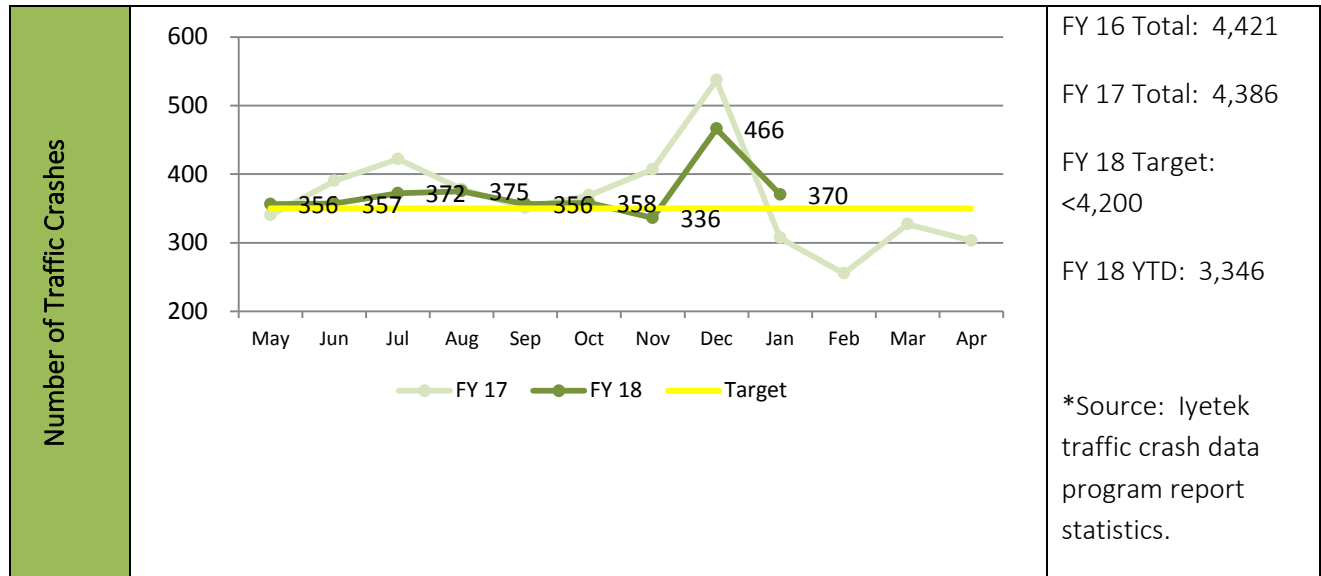
KPI 2: Community Outreach

Given significant local and national events, there is demand for open communication and transparency from the Police Department. This KPI will be part of a greater focus on community policing activities within the department in 2017. By proactively reaching out and connecting with demographic specific targets, the police department can build relationships prior to a potential critical incident involving a member of that group.



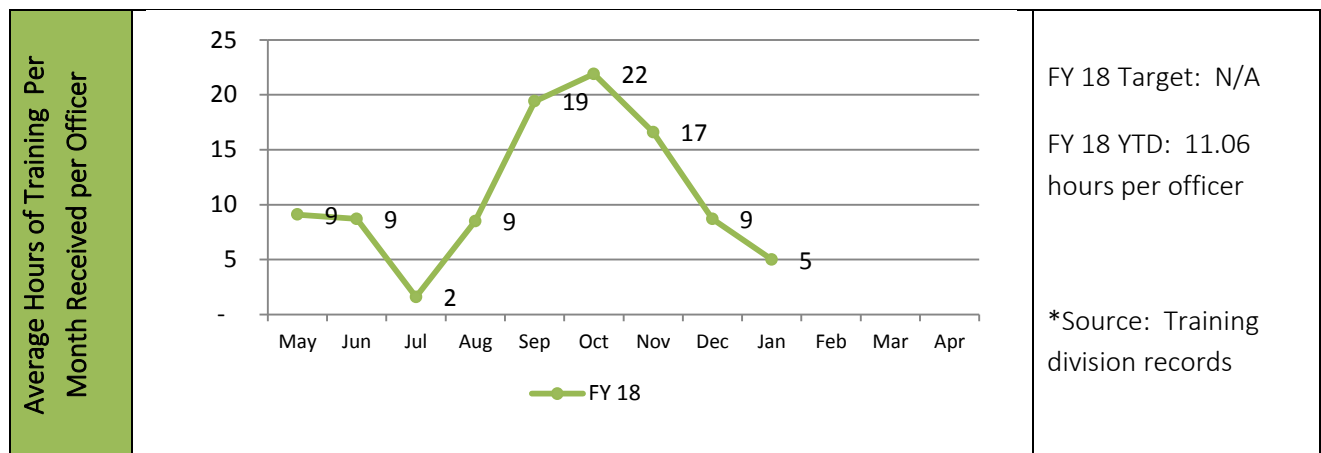
KPI 3: Traffic Crashes

Traffic safety is a relevant issue for residents and visitors alike. Unlike violent crime, which is less common in Schaumburg, several traffic crashes occur in the village every day. The latest statistics provided by the police crime analyst reveal there has been a steady increase over three years in total crashes, with 495 crashes in 2015 resulting in injuries. In order to reduce the number of traffic accidents, the village positions auxiliary officers during peak hours at locations that experience a high volume of accidents.



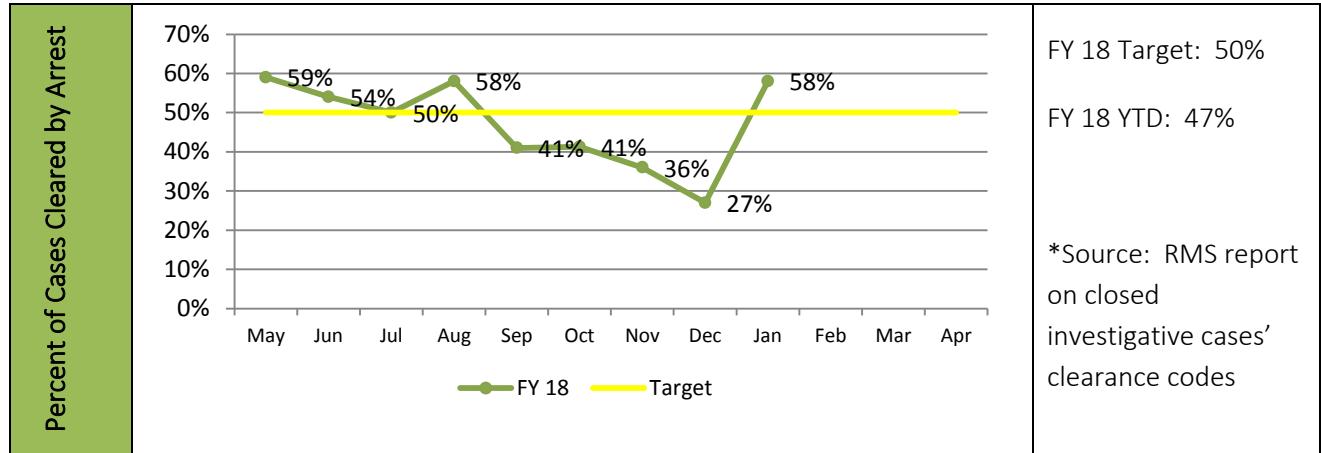
KPI 4: Training Received Per Patrol Officer

The department includes internal and external training events and time for each officer. The department promotes external training when available, and builds on training time by conducting additional in-shift training. Further, the department taps into the knowledge of the sergeants and identifies them as subject matter experts in one specific field, to which they can share training on this topic with their shift and perhaps the other patrol shifts as they are able. Additionally, this will enhance the skills and ability of officers and develop leadership skills in the sergeants.



KPI 5: Investigations Clearance

The Police Department will look to maintain the percentage of investigations cleared. We do so by a monthly supervisor review at the command level, to ensure quality. Also documentation of good and bad cases will be made public to enhance training within the unit.



KPI 6: Special Operations Hotel Program

Increase hotel building check UCR calls for service, improving year to year from 2016. The department will continue to encourage officers to spend time checking hotels and meeting hotel staff as a way to develop relationships and gain information about potential criminal activity at hotels. This will encompass a growing focus on prostitution and drug activity. Further, officers can act as village ambassadors through the increased presence at hotels, interacting with guests and visitors.
